Why Daylight Saving Time?

There is evidence early man changed his time to fit the sun. Benjamin Franklin suggested people getting up an hour earlier would burn fewer candles.

During WWI in 1918, President Woodrow Wilson signed **Fast Time** into law to support the war effort but it was repealed 7 months later.

During WWII the switch was called **War Time**. The law also established the five time zones as we know them today.

President Lyndon Johnson signed the **Uniform Time Act** of 1966. In 1967, the Ohio Senate elected to make it 7 months a year (last Sunday in March to last Sunday in October). Our Ohio representative, Ken Creasy, campaigned against it and voted that way.* Local farmers were against it but city golfers wanted it.

During the oil embargo, **Daylight Savings Time (DST)** was stretched to 10 months in 1974 and back to 8 in 1975 - reported statics said 10,000 barrels per day were saved.

President George Bush's Energy Policy Act of 2005 extended **DST** to eight months a year from second Sunday in March to first Sunday in November.
