## Johnson’s Island

How and why an island in Lake Erie became a POW camp for Confederate officers is the topic for Roy Nichols’ program to the Big Walnut Area Historical Society at 7:30, Tuesday, November 12, in the Myers Inn Museum Meeting Room. The program is free and open to the public.

Johnson’s Island is a 300 acre island in Ottawa county in Sandusky Bay near Marblehead. It is about 300 acres and almost a mile long and ½ mile wide. Known as Bull’s Island after an early owner, E. W. Bull., it was sold to L. B. Johnson in 1852. According to the Duff Papers in Ashland Library, the government leased 40 acres for a Confederate prisoners of war in 1861.

Nichols graduated from Ashland High School and got his B.A. from Gordon College in Massachusetts in 1967 and a M.A.T from Oberlin College in 1968. He taught history and American government in Midview High School in Grafton, Ohio, while he attended law classes and earned his law degree from Cleveland Marshall Law School in 1972. **(Continue page 2)**

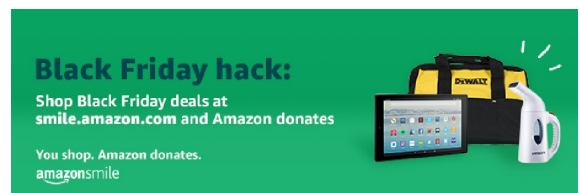

# What Was the Racket Store?



In June, Nathan Reynolds visited the Myers Inn with 2 coins he found with his metal detector. They were made of zinc to use as shopping tokens for The Racket Store in Sunbury. He had seen the photo at the right on the Big Walnut History website.

The Racket Store was on the northwest corner of Cherry and Vernon Streets facing Sunbury Square from 1912 to about 1918. It was an all purpose department store officially called M. Weiss and Sons. Weiss' daughter recalled the store in her vignette in "The People Book."

Mildred Weiss Tarnish wrote, "Most everyone made their own clothes, so there were shelves and shelves of all kinds of bright fabrics and I learned to distinguish one from the other, There were also dress trimmings, buttons, spool cabinets with their array of bright colors, hat pins which women wore to anchor their hats or just to embellish them, laces and embroideries.

"The men's department was not so interesting to me but the grocery department at the rear of the store was handy for a mealtime snack when my mother was busy working. There was the pickle barrel of sweet pickles, large wheels of yellow cheese, peanut butter in tubs, cookie and cracker barrels to reach into (cookies were sold by the pound and not prepackaged in those days) and fruit in season such as bananas and grapes.

"On the second floor of the store were rugs and since they were only shown occasionally, the big pile of carpets was a soft place for a nap on a long Saturday afternoon."



## THE RACKET HONEST METHOD

In 1915 Mr. Weise suffered a severe heart attack which forced him to retire. His son Joe ran the store until he was called up in WWI. It was sold to Chancey A. Root.

The frame building burned in the 1927 fire of the north side of Cherry Street. The new brick building was Root's Department Store, and is now Linda Powell's.
