### Letter from the President


Dear Society Members and Friends,

#### My German Ancestor Story by Polly Brehm Horn

When stories were told around the dining room table, I was fascinated by the story of Jack's grandmother who was brought from Germany to Delaware by a Countess. Not knowing there was ever royalty in Delaware I was amazed to learn that Nelly Lytle and her sister from Delaware went to a resort in Baden, Germany, where Nellie met and married Count Botho zu Eulenburg. Augusta Simmler was one of 4 daughters and two sons of Joseph and Ida Simmler of Griessen (in Baden), Germany. She had a job as a maid for the Countess in the resort. When the Countess came to Delaware, she paid the fares for Augusta to follow her.

Augusta sailed on the ship Aller from Bremen to England then to New York where she went through Ellis Island on October 4, 1890 at the age of 24. Speaking little English she followed her nose and discovered donuts, bought a large bag of them for her train ride to Delaware, Ohio. After that trip she would never eat a donut again.

At St. Mary's Church, Augusta met a blacksmith, Joseph Brehm, who was born in Bavaria but immigrated from Baden-Baden, Germany two years before Augusta, they married and became the grandparents of my husband Jack Brehm. When Joseph was too old to blacksmith, he and his sons worked in the Delaware Chair Factory each carrying two chairs home for the women to cane the next day. They got fifty cents a chair.

When SHOWA was built one of the directors told me Honda chose this area because of the work-ethic of the German-Americans. Come to Martin's presentation to learn more about these immigrants.
